Content

Abstract Introduction Dar-Alamal was established in 1986 for children without parental care, it is a governmental care home for accommodation and care of children without bond in Wad Medani, Gezira, Sudan. This article brings to the light a care home for founding which they are a part of the society and should be socially acceptable, they have their rights and needs which should be satisfied well to make them participate in community building in the future. Objective To evaluate Dar-Alamal Governmental Care Home for children. Methodology A qualitative study performed through direct structured interview. Results The care home consist of three rooms or wards, each room includes 4-5 children. It receives about 100 - 118 child every year, the allowable age is from one day to three years old, after this age the child is transferred to ALmaigoma care home in khartoum. Food, clothes and treatment are provided by governmental, private and charitable organizations efforts. The care home is receiving funds from : Ministry of social affairs, Zakat chamber, national health insurance fund and other NGOs. The total number of workers in the care home is 33 : director, assistant director, visiting doctor, psychologist, nutritionist, 12 nursemaid, 3 nurses, 3 supervisors, 5 cleaning workers, 2 drivers, 2 sentinels and techie. Conclusion Although the governmental care home has done a good job in providing shelter and care for children, still more effort must be taken to improve this issue to preserve the child's right to live a healthy life.
