Content	In Israel, there are approximately 45,000 adolescents and young adults at risk. These populations have difficulty accessing health care and seeking medical treatment due to lack of trust in the health care system, a bad experience with the system, fear of procedures, feeling humiliated and disrespected by the medical staff, etc. When these populations do approach the health care system in order to get medical treatment, they do not have a regular physician that monitors their status. Instead, they tend to use the emergency department excessively with repeated visits. As a result, they increase stress on the system, more so than the general population. On top of that, health care providers raised difficulty. They feel unqualified treating these populations and in need of guidance when approaching these patients. With this in mind, a group of health providers and social services in Jerusalem peered and created a program. Our program aims to educate health care providers in the emergency departments and clinics in the community on these populations. The program teaches the health care providers about these populations' health needs, their difficulty of both approaching health services and taking care of themselves, and the resources that are available to help them. We aspire to create connections between health providers and social services. Our program's effectiveness is evaluated in the research we are conducting. Our research evaluates the health care providers' knowledge about these populations, confidence in treating them, and attitudes towards them before and after the program. Our goals in terms of increasing the competencies of health providers to attend these populations include educating them about 1.
